From Reverend Andy

You will hear of wars and rumors of wars but see to it that you are not alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come. Mt 24:6

I was away on Sabbatical last month from 17 September to 16 October, of which, two weeks was hiking the Camino de Santiago from Astorga to Santiago on Pilgrimage with 8 other warriors and 3 staff from Warriors on the Way, an organization that facilitates combat veterans to go on pilgrimage together. On Camino the days were simple and powerful. Simple, as I would often rise earlier than the rest to get myself ready for the day, which was, simple. We would have worship every morning and be on the Way by 7 AM at the latest, some days a lot earlier, depending on the goals for the day. The mornings were always cool and quiet, and we would, as a practice, start the day in silence for the first half hour or so. As we walked, we would watch the world awaken. In Spain the sun comes up late, almost everyday we began our walk before sunrise. And so we walked, and kept walking. This stretch of the Camino is notoriously uphill so when the grade got steeper, I would get out the hiking poles which gives a little more horsepower going uphill. We'd complain and get angry, we'd laugh and comment on the beauty around us, we would pass fellow 'peregrinos' (pilgrims) and wish them well with a hearty "Buen Camino" the greeting of encouragement along the way.

After 15-18 miles in the average day we would arrive at our 'albergue' (hostel) which was usually a bunkhouse along the Camino for pilgrims. We would get cleaned up and changed and have a little afternoon relaxing. We would gather in the evening, to discuss the day's reflection that was set during worship that morning. Sometimes it would be light and breezy, but other topics, about ego, about loss, about letting go and about the reality of war, would spark powerful conversations that would go late into the night. Inevitably the conversation of warriors and wounds, sacrifice and service, and what we still carried. Then we would sleep the way 18 miles of hard road brings sleep. Simple and powerful. Eat, sleep, walk, repeat.

Our lives today are largely divorced from these two great realities of simplicity and power. The busy-ness and complexity of modern life, the requirements of holding life together, the real human pain we watch playing itself out on the global stage with the horror of war and economic uncertainty, none of it is simple and it buries us in banality, rather than raise us into the beauty of life.

In Matthew, Jesus not just says we are going to confront war in this life, but that its whole

function will be to alarm us, to lose ourselves in the complexity and conflict and the horror and the difficulty that will drain away all meaning and purpose and power. This is not a text of prophecy about the future, it's a text of instruction right now.

Friends don't lose the simplicity and power of your life be lost to the 'alarm' of the 'wars and rumors of wars'. We will struggle, in fact we are made for it, but that is not the panic, the alarm, that comes from corrosion of despair. The great Portuguese author Fernando Sabino wrote, "In the end, everything will be okay. If it's not okay, it's not yet the end." Live now the simplicity and power of your life. Eat. Sleep. Walk. Repeat. Do not let the enemy steal life's beauty, because we are on this road for such a short time and have stories yet to tell that we do not yet know.

Thomas Merton gave an instruction that lives on for all Pilgrims,

"You do not need to know precisely what is happening, or exactly where it is all going. What you need is to recognize the possibilities and challenges offered by the present moment, and to embrace them with courage, faith, and hope."

Mission Work In Panama

Hello! My name is Sophia Fernandes and I am an active member of the church. I attend Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences where I am a member of my University's chapter of Global Brigades. Global Brigades' mission is to inspire, mobilize, and collaborate with communities to achieve their own health and economic goals with a vision to "give millions of empowered community members the resources and capacity to thrive."

In May 2024, I will be attending our first medical brigade to Panama where I will volunteer my time to implement mobile clinics in communities that otherwise would not have access to healthcare. For those who have been following me through this journey, the Brigade was originally scheduled for December of 2023 and we were supposed to go to Ghana. If you have already donated, the money will still go towards my Brigade!

Through money raised by volunteers, Global Brigades is able to provide community members with pro-bono general medical consultations, vision screenings and other specialized care. I will have the opportunity to assist in triage, take vital signs, and facilitate health education workshops. Global Brigades has been able to perform over 1.5 million medical consultations and I hope to be able to help raise that number. Global Brigades is almost entirely funded through volunteer fundraising. The funds that I raise go towards providing medical care to those who otherwise would not have access to it, and they will allow me to physically travel to Panama to donate my time to help implement clinics in underserved communities. Missions News!!

Fellow First Congregational members and friends! We are upon the season of giving and Thanksgiving and I am so very thankful for our time of fellowship at the 4th Annual "United We Move" which is United Way of Greater Fall River's Annual Appeal. Reverend Andy shared that he visited BMC Durfee High School and learned that 90% of teachers, staff, and students there have benefited in some way, directly or indirectly, from United Way programs and care - simply astounding and at the same time humbling that we at FCC own a small part of this great gift. We were 15 strong Pilgrims stepping our way over the roots and rocks of the Tattapanum Trail and the rain did not dampen our spirits in the least; in fact, I feel it refreshed us. Reverend Andy, in his reflections afterward, said our relationship-building and bonding through our walk brings the love of Jesus outside our church walls. It provides hope to people who are strangers to us yet we bring forth the life blood of our church and its contributions in the caring of the wider community. This is what it means when we hear "This is church being the church." Your missions committee donated \$480 to the United Way based on the number of walkers who hit the trail. Thank you to all and may you receive God's blessings.

Another reason for thankfulness is our participation and hosting once again of the United Way's Coat Drive starting Wednesday, November 1st at 9:30 in our gymnasium and continuing weekly until February. Last year we distributed 1404 coats to more than 30 community partners. In addition, we packed up 1000 knitted accessories, blankets and boots to groups who do homeless outreach.

And there is no doubt the Holy Spirit moves through us and among us as I received a call from Brendan White, Behavior Therapist at the Resiliency Preparatory Academy, our school neighbors next door. He shared that his students have been asking when community service starts again at FCC - they want to come back! Such a meaningful relationship growing on both sides as we answer God's call and truly need each other to meet the needs of the most vulnerable in Fall River. We welcome volunteers and appreciate any time you can give – even if but an hour. Please check us out and "Experience Something Greater Than Yourself" when you touch the heart of a tween/teen trying to make sense of it all and an individual trying to find an extra layer of warmth to ward off the impending winter chill.

I have been visiting "Laundry Love," bringing a smile and hospitality to the many families there in conversation and support of each other. Missions will be donating laundry detergent/dryer sheets on a quarterly basis, and we encourage donations be brought to the church as you are able. "Laundry Love" meets the last Wednesday of each month from 9:00 - 12:00 at Kam's Laundromat located on 415 Second St Fall River. Join us for a cup of coffee and a sense of the vital community that gathers there trying to put their best foot forward with the dignity that clean clothes provide. Blessings to John Milkey who brought this nationwide, recognized program to Fall River.

Related to Christmas giving, we have been contacted by both St. Vincent's Childrens Services and Fall River Deaconess Home with a request to consider the Christmas stocking stuffing and pajamas/slippers projects once again. Our committee has met and agreed to support both – more details to come on ways to make this year the brightest Christmas ever for youth served in these communities.

The Acoaxet Chapel in Westport continue to fund raise for their mission's trip to the Dominican Republic in February 2024. They are holding a Spaghetti Supper on Wednesday, November 8 at 6 PM. A group of us attended their last Spaghetti Supper back in June and it was delicious and plentiful for a great price with a variety of awesome door prizes and raffles. Doris Thornton won the 50-50 raffle then generously returned her winnings back to benefit the trip – thank you Doris we are not surprised - your heart barely fits in your chest!!!! 
