From Reverend Andy

'Pilgrimage - pīl'grə-mīj - noun

A journey to a sacred place or shrine.

A long journey or search, especially one of exalted purpose or moral significance.

A journey undertaken by a pilgrim; a traveling on through a strange country or to some place deemed sacred in order to perform some religious vow or duty, or obtain some spiritual or miraculous benefit.

As participants in the Warriors on the Way, we are on a Pilgrimage'

These words are the beginning of my orientation where, in a few weeks, on the 14th of September, I am stepping off to walk 180 miles of the Camino de Santiago in Spain and spend a month on Sabbatical. I am immensely grateful to the church for this time to deepen my own pilgrimage and take time away (Luke 5:16). For over a thousand years, pilgrims have come from all over the world to walk the path from France across Spain to Santiago, known as the Camino de Santiago, or the Way of Saint James. My path, from Astorga to Santiago in Northern Spain will be with an organization called Warriors on the Way (<https://warriorsontheway.org/about/>). If you were at our last All Church Family Night you got to hear from its leader, my friend and colleague Fr. Steven Rindahl.

This opportunity to walk with other combat veterans in a journey of witness and healing over sacred ground is a blessing of a lifetime. I am both excited and apprehensive, unsure what I will find in the mountains of Spain and on its ancient paths, but always certain the Lord has blessing for us when we go looking for Him.

I am excited that during my time away the church will have the opportunity to spend time with Rev. John Carson, a dear friend and one of the best pastors I know. I have full confidence in his commitment, service, and care for the church in my absence. There are a number of things coming up I'll be sad to miss and I am sure that John and the church will greatly enjoy as we lean into the fall season. I pray you'll all follow me along the way of Saint James. The standard greeting on the Camino is, "Buen Camino" meaning "Good Way!" or Good Journey". It is used as a salutation as pilgrims meet and depart, and local will greet 'peregrinos' (pilgrims) with the phrase as well. To the church and to each of you who are dear

to my heart, I say, 'Buen Camino!' I pray this time of journeying apart is a Good Way, not just for the church as a whole but for each one of you. That you might know blessings and grace in the days ahead and that there is a deeper and wider sweetness of Spirit present amongst us all in my return.

So I say to you my brothers and sisters in Christ, "Buen Camino!" for we, 'As participants in First Congregational Church of Fall River, are on a Pilgrimage.'

Mission Work In Ghana



Hello! My name is Sophia Fernandes and I am an active member of the church. I attend Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences where I am a member of my University's chapter of Global Brigades. Global Brigades' mission is to inspire, mobilize, and collaborate with communities to achieve **their own health and economic goals with a vision to “give millions of empowered community members** the resources and capacity to thrive. In December 2023, I will be attending our first medical brigade to Ghana where I will volunteer my time to implement mobile clinics in communities that otherwise would not have access to healthcare. I will have the opportunity to assist in triage, take vital signs, and facilitate health education workshops. Through money raised by volunteers, Global Brigades is able to provide community members with pro-bono general medical consultations, vision screenings and other specialized care. Global Brigades has been able to perform over 1.5 million medical consultations and I hope to be able to help raise that number. Global Brigades is almost entirely funded through volunteer fundraising. The funds that I raise go towards providing medical care to those who otherwise would not have access to it, and they will allow me to physically travel to Ghana to donate my time to help implement clinics in underserved communities.
